Age	Unknown	The Council's Fees and Charges register includes all fees and charges. As they affect all users depending on the service then it is unknown what the impact will be on each group. Specific changes to charges that may affect young people are increases to school meal costs, noting that Primary 1-5 are all entitled to free school meals. Other service changes that will directly affect people is the 5% inflationary uplift in Sport and Leisure fees. It is presumed that Sport and Leisure facilities are accessed by people of all protected characteristics, therefore it is not possible to know the impact of this change. Other changes that will affected people of different protected characteristics is the increase in charges for care related services. It should be noted that some benefits have increased annually whilst care related charges have not; and it is anticipated that increased benefits could be used to offset some of the care charge changes.
